Gettysburg Address

Address delivered at the dedication of the benetery at Gettysburg.

Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this Continent, a new nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created egral.

Now we are engaged in a great circl war, lesting whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battle field of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field, as a final resting place for those who here gave their live, that that nation might live. It is attacted that fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we can not dedu-

cate- we can not consecrate- we can not hallow this ground. The braw men, live ing and dead, who struggled here have con: secrated it, for above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note nor long remember what we pay here, but it can never forget what they did hero. It is forus the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fou: gho here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us_ that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have diew in vain- that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of fee. dow - and that government of the people,

by the people, for the people, shall not per: ish from the earth.
